We, this community, have promised to be here for our children. We want them to know that the church is theirs too! We want them to know that they are valued members of the community. We want them to know that they belong.

If we don't help them to know these things now, while they are younger, why would we be surprised or hurt, if they decide not to participate when they are older?

Keeping Our Kids Engaged

They might not look like they are paying attention, but when kneeling on the floor, using the pew seat as a coloring desk, they are taking in more than we think! We have **bags of crayons and coloring sheets that focus on each Sunday's Gospel** in the Narthex (foyer) right next to the bulletins.

People sometimes look a little panic stricken at the suggestion that they sit up front, but the closer the kids are to the action, the more they will feel the energy generated by the readings, music, sermon, and ritual. And if there are kids with whom Fr. Andy can make eye contact, his language choices will shift in subtle ways to make the sermon accessible to them.

If you need to escape, and please don't read this paragraph as instruction to take restless or crying children out of the room, there are **children's books, and buckets of Legos**, downstairs, in the Parish Hall. Father Andy's office, through the side door of the church, next to the copier, is always open and on the bookcase you will find **brio trains and some Dr. Seuss books**.

There is a **changing table** in the bathroom at the foot of the narthex (foyer) steps, fully stocked with changing supplies. If you need directions, please ask an Usher.

And perhaps most importantly, **we are committed to helping them find a role in our Common Prayer!** We welcome your kids to serve as **Ushers/Greeters, Acolytes, Readers, and Communion Servers!** If they are interested, and you think they are ready, we want them to be active participants in the liturgy (literally, the work of the people)! Let Father Andy know and he will engage you, and your kids in a supportive and encouraging conversation!
